A young family's living space doesn't sacrifice style

Elegant, adult furnishings in a household with three young children?

It can be done. Just ask interior designers Kara Childress and Blayne Laborde of Kara Childress Inc., who gave this nearly 9,000square-foot, Mediterranean Revival home in the Memorial area relaxed, European charm. Designed by Ken Newberry of Newberry Campa Architects for a family of five, the interior blends Fortuny pillows and French Boiserie with homework stations and bunk

Childress commissioned many pieces but also used antiques liberally. Some of the home's most stunning features are reclaimed architectural elements from Chateau Domingue - among them two French mantels, a set of farmhouse doors and aged French oak.

Old and new are masterfully woven throughout, but especially in the dining room. Here, the oak mingles dramatically with limestone tiles from Walker Zanger, laying the foundation for a truly livable space.
